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Design Innovation in Ilkal textiles and Kasuti embroidery crafts

Heart for Art worked with the Deshpande Foundation's Navodyami program and the artisans of North Karnataka to create new products. Known for its Ilkal textiles and Kasuti embroidery crafts, the region around Huballi in North Karnataka has nurtured these crafts for many centuries.

The project was started in the Deshpande Foundation Sandbox of North Karnataka to create new products that include flies, folders, iPad, Tablet Covers, Jewellery and many others. The products were created with an innovative combination of the textiles of Ilkal and the 6th century craft of Kasuti embroidery. The plan is to prototype these contemporary use products and train the artisans to make these products to increase their incomes and improve their skills.





Applying a 'bottom up' approach to scalable building solutions, the Foundation Deshpande Hubli Sandbox works to create an effective ecosystem where resources are put through entrepreneurship, use innovation and sustainability. Located in northwest Karnataka in India, the Hubli Sandbox engages with not-for-profits, academics, organizations entrepreneurs who are involved with the launch of effective and scalable models of development. They seek to empower communities with leadership and development skill programs that prepare urban and rural youth to lead or manage enterprises. Through such programs, they strive to launch effective, relevant and scalable solutions through the investment of social enterprises. To date, they have reached more than one million families in Northern Karnataka.



Navodyami program is one such Innovative program of Deshpande Foundation which is geared to create, support and scale micro-entrepreneurship at the bottom of the pyramid. Navodyami is the one of the few programs running in Northwest Karnataka that combines training micro-entrepreneurs like us and direct marketing for and on behalf of micro-entrepreneurs and help them to turnaround their turnover to about three to five times in two years time.

New Art & Crafts

Exquisite masks from MAJULI, Assam by master artisan KHAGEN GOSWAMI



The sea-wide Brahmaputra river, as it flows down in Upper Assam near Jorhat, has kept Majuli, the largest riverine island of the world, remote, and has in its oyster demurely preserved its prized pearl. That of the unique Neo-Vaishnavite culture of Majuli, practised through its Satras.

Natun Samaguri Satra is famous for mask making, and remains the flag-bearer of Mukha-Samskriti aspect of Neo-Vaishnavism of Majuli. Masks include — heads of Hanuman and Ravana, Surpanakha and Jatayu, and of many others.

Ilkal textiles & Kasuti embroidery Products

Flies, folders, iPad, Tablet Covers, Jewellery and many others were created with an innovative combination of the textiles of Ilkal and the 6th century craft of Kasuti embroidery. The distinctive feature of Ilkal textile is the use of a form of embroidery called as Kasuti. Some of the product pictures are given below

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Featured Artisan- Khagen Goswami

Khagen Goswami- the master craftsman of the famous Majuli masks is from the island of Majuli in Assam where he makes headgear for the raas leela festival and for bhaona, a style of vibrant street theatre from Assam. He has been working to revive mask making arts past glory and make them available for tourists in smaller and convenient forms.



He is carrying on the tradition of mask-making passed on by his forefather. He imparts the skills for free at the Samaguri Satra whichhas taken the lead in the production of these dramatic masks and in the end gives certificates under the banner of the 'Guru-Shishya Programme' of the Government of India. Currently, 15 students are learning the art form in the satra.

His masks have also been exported to places like Israel, France and the UK. He has conducted multiple workshops across the country. Recently Heart for Art was partnered with The Mask Project to organise the display and sale of traditional masks and Khagen Goswami's Majuli masks were appreciated by the visitors.
