

We organized FEDORA:: The Hat Project — a two day exhibition & sale of traditional & contemporary Pagadis, Phetas, Hats, Caps, Picnic Baskets, Picnic Mats & colourful holiday clothes from artisans around India at Gyan Adaab, Kalyaninagar on 14th & 15th April.

The following summer products were showcased at the exhibition.

• Hats made from bamboo, golden grass, darbha grass, palm leaves, vetiver, cotton, silk and more. Hats from Mizoram, Assam, Odisha and phetas and pagadis from Rajasthan, Mysore, Pune and other parts of India. Picnic baskets made from bamboo, kauna grass, rattan and other materials from Manipur, Assam, Kerala among many other regions.

- Picnic mats made from darbha, korai, banana fiber and other natural materials.
- Beach bags and shoulder bags made from palm leaves, banana fiber and cloth!
- Disposable plates and lunch sets made from betel nut palm leaves
- Hand-fans from bamboo and golden grass which help to enjoy the picnics of the summer holidays in a natural and sustainable manner much like it used to be done until the 70s and 80s!

# GIFT INDIAN CRAFT CONFERENCE GIVEAWAYS

We got Dhokra metal craft master artisan Shubha Karmakar, from Dariyapur of Bardhaman district of West Bengal bulk order of Dhokra Radha-Krishna figurine which was give aways to national and international delegates at the 2nd India International Down Syndrome Conference held at the Corinthian, Pune 31st May - 2nd June.

Many thanks to Shweta Ranka who played a big part in organizing the event and gave our artisans the opportunity.

In Dariyapur, the artisan families migrated from Odisha 120 years ago and presently there are 133 artisans who practise the Dhokra craft form as their chief source of income. This is an ancient technique of production of non-ferrous metal ware by the lost wax casting process. The artisans follow the process which is believed to be 5000 years old and their outstanding characteristic is that they don't polish their work after casting and this gives the pieces a peerless quality. Tribal figures, animals, deities along with jewellery are the primary focus on dokra artworks of this area.

New Art & Crafts

Last quarter we have introduced following crafts on our online site.

#### **BHAONA PLAY Masks of Majuli, Assam**

Majuli Island is home to the ancient mask handicraft tradition of Assam. Bhaona forms the traditional art of popular theatre performed in Assam. Masks, costumes and jewellery form an important part of presenting the different characters of the play. One unique feature of these masks is they are quite lightweight, despite large dimensions. Based on size and material used in making a mask, it may take a week to a fortnight before it is ready for use. No synthetic colours are used. The artisans are resorting to vegetable based colors owing to an increasing environment awareness drives. Till now these masks are not

Jute Cotton Bags of Belgaum, Karnataka The craftswomen of Rajankatti, Makelmardi, Kadoli, Hunnur, Telaganatti, Madanbhavi, and Chikoppa in Belgaum district (which are drought prone regions) in the state of Karnataka make high quality, naturally-dyed, hand spun, hand woven and non-woven bags from the natural fibres of jute, cotton, banana, mestha fibre, leather, and blended fabrics. #### Dhokra Metalcraft, Odisha

Dhokra metal casting of Orissa is synonymous with the traditional craft of bell metal or brass. It is a typical tribal art form and practiced by tribal families. The dokhra metal casting craft is practiced in the districts of Puri, Dhenkanal, Nayagarh, Khurda, Keonjhar, Sambalpur, Mayurbhanj, Phulbani and Ganjam in Orissa.

### Featured Artisan Binay Kumar Ghosh

Binay Kumar Ghosh, who is from Jhargram district of West Bengal makes golden grass hats and participates in different trade shows for promoting his products. Traditionally, various forms of golden grass products, especially baskets were used by locals in Odisha.

The golden grass (locally known as 'Kaincha') hats are made using dried grass (Vetiver Zizanoids) which becomes yellow and golden in colour. 'Kainch' is a wild grass found in many parts of Odisha. It is sturdy and can be moulded to any shape to make items of household use like baskets, boxes, mats, coasters, pen holders, wall-hangings and so on. This grass grows to a height of about 5-6 feet and the inflorescent stick, which appears after monsoon, is used for weaving.

The golden grass is making waves and more and more city dwellers are discovering the beauty of golden grass products as they are ecofriendly and biodegradable. This craft has got great aesthetic appeal and conforms to 100 per cent natural living. It is because of this reason that there is optimism that this craft will survive the test of time. But as of now, it is a rare craft. We are trying to establish its market in urban spaces by

promoting them on our online store and exhibitions like 'FEDORA :: The Hat Project".

## GANAPATI DECORATION WITH SHOLPAITH

We will organise Ganapati Decorations with Sholapith workshops in Pune from 17th-21st August and in Mumbai from 24th to 26th August. 100% natural-Shola is a plant that grows in the marshy lands of West Bengal. Sholapith craft is used to create delicately carved flowers, headgear for Gods and decorative items which are 100% biodegradable. During workshop, the artisans would teach how to make some eco-friendly flowers and other decorative items. Partcipants will learn from them how to make makhar and their favourite modaks also. The workshop will be conducted Rabindranath Haldar, 76 yrs old who is a state awardee Sholapith artist and his son, Rathindra from the Mahespur Village of West Bengal.
